

Montreal-based conductor **Daniel Black** has earned a reputation as a conductor capable of delivering "vital and engaging" performances. Daniel completed a highly-successful four-year tenure as Resident Conductor of the Florida Orchestra in 2022. After joining as Assistant Conductor in 2018, he was quickly promoted to Associate Conductor and then Resident Conductor as his contract was twice extended. With The Florida Orchestra, he conducted over fifty performances per season, including Masterworks, Pops, film concerts, Coffee Concerts, Family and Youth concerts, and more. Prior to his engagement with The Florida Orchestra, Daniel served as Assistant and then Associate Conductor of the Fort Worth Symphony in Texas, conducting over 150 performances.

Passionate about expanding the core orchestral repertoire, in recent seasons Daniel has led the world premiere of Pulitzer Prize-winner Kevin Puts' triple concerto *Contact* with the string trio Time for Three, the U.S. premiere of Eleanor Alberga's dramatic work *Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs*, and has conducted the works of Gabriela Lena Frank, Florence Price, Jesse Montgomery, Philip Glass, Jennifer Higdon, Samuel Coleridge-Taylor, Jimmy Lopez, Lembit Beecher, and more. In 2016, he conducted the Midwest premiere and first professional recording of John Harmon's *Crazy Horse Symphony* to great acclaim.



Fluent in Russian, and having studied at the famed St. Petersburg Conservatory, he has a particular affinity for the Russian repertoire, having led performances of Tchaikovsky's First Symphony, Rachmaninov's *Rhapsody on a Theme of Corelli* and Shostakovich's Fifth Symphony, among many others. In 2022 he conducted Galina Ustvolskaya's little known gem *Symphonic Poem No. 2* with The Florida Orchestra.

Equally at home in the opera pit, Daniel had a successful debut with Bernstein's *Candide* at Michigan Opera Theatre, and has conducted the Dnipro State Opera in Ukraine, Coleridge-Taylor's *Dream Lovers* with Chicago's South Side Opera Company, and Northwestern University opera. In 2017 he was assistant conductor for the China premiere of *Bright Sheng's Dream of the Red Chamber*, touring China with the composer. In 2017-2018, he received opera conducting fellowships from the Solti Foundation U.S., working with Opera Theatre St. Louis and the Florentine Opera Company respectively.

Daniel has been active as a guest conductor, having appeared with the Buffalo Philharmonic, West Virginia Symphony, Hamilton Philharmonic, San Antonio Symphony, Owensboro Symphony, Texarkana Symphony, St. Petersburg Symphony "Classica", Rockford Symphony, Savannah Philharmonic and the Wisconsin Chamber Orchestra, among others. An innovative programmer, he has offered works such as Honneger's Pacific 231, Stravinsky's Dumbarton Oaks Concerto and Mason Bates' Mothership. In 2023-24, Daniel will make his debut with the Kitchener-Waterloo Symphony, and will return to the Buffalo Philharmonic Orchestra, the Florida Orchestra, and the Hamilton Philharmonic, among other engagements.

Daniel has thrice been awarded the Solti Foundation U.S. Career Assistance Award, and was a conducting fellow at the Aspen Music Festival, the Kurt Masur Conducting Workshop, and the Cabrillo Festival of Contemporary Music. He has studied with Kurt Masur, Edo de Waart, Robert Spano, Hugh Wolff, Larry Rachleff, Marin Alsop, Daniel Lewis, David Effron, and Gunther Schuller. Daniel has studied conducting at the St. Petersburg Conservatory, Eastman School of Music, and Northwestern University, counting among his mentors Leonid Korchmar, Neil Varon and Victor Yampolsky. He has studied composition with Richard Danielpour.

Daniel is currently one of four finalists in the search for the next Music Director of the Prince Edward Island Symphony Orchestra. Find out more about him at danielblackconductor.com.








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

Sri Lankan-born Ottawa-based artist **Dinuk Wijeratne** is a Juno-winning composer, conductor, teacher, and pianist known for his innovative boundary-crossing works. *Yatra* was commissioned by Symphony Nova Scotia and the Toronto Symphony Orchestra in 2016 for the Canada 150 Celebration. The Sanskrit word *yatra* translates as "journey" but means a great deal more. It is a journey or pilgrimage to a sacred place that brings the traveler closer to the divine. The journey itself is as important as the destination. With this brief fanfare, Dinuk is inviting us on today's musical journey.




"I wanted to include how bright and wonderful a person she was, rather than just [the idea that] she was a victim, because she was so much more than that." A simple motif is repeated and grows more complex much like a shared message on social media until it becomes a riot of sound. Amid the cacophony a solo drum depicts the isolation that Amanda experienced. But that is countered by the energetic brass showing her strength and courage in facing the harm inflicted on her. Slowly, almost painfully the tensions dissipate and there is a glimmer of optimism and hope. The hope that Amanda's story can help others.

The death in 2023 of **Jocelyn Morlock** robbed Canada of one of its most gifted composers. She was known for her complex compositions inspired by birds and nature. However, *My Name is Amanda Todd* found inspiration in a very human tragedy. The work is a tribute to 15-year-old Amanda who took her own life because of relentless cyber bullying and sexual exploitation. At its premiere in 2016 Morlock wrote,



Joseph Bologne was the son of a French plantation owner and a Senegalese slave, born in Guadeloupe in 1745. His father recognized him as his son and took him to Paris when the boy was seven and gave him the best education possible. Bologne was to prove a talented composer, violinist, and conductor as well as a highly accomplished fencer, athlete, dancer, and soldier. He was granted the title "Chevalier de Saint-Georges" when he became an Officer of the King's Bodyguard. His catalogue as a composer includes operas, chamber works, violin concerti, arias, and two symphonies. The *Symphony No. 2 in D Major* was premiered

in March of 1780 and was to be repurposed the following year as the overture for his only extant opera *L'amante anonyme*. It follows the tradition of an opera sinfonia with three string dominated movements arranged as fast-slow-fast played without pause. It begins with a ceremonial movement in D Major with the oboes and horns adding drama to the opening. The *Andante* for strings only, offers a pause between the two livelier movements. The conclusion is a *Presto* in the style of a zesty tarantella.



Johannes Brahms is not normally associated with humour, however on at least one occasion he proved to be a bit of a wag. In 1880 the University of Breslau (now the University of Wroclaw) announced the awarding of an honorary doctorate to the composer. However, there was a catch: in return, the Chancellor and Trustees expected a composition in honour of the University. When he conducted the premiere of his Academic Festival Overture at Convocation on January 4th, 1881 the students where highly amused, the University officers less so. He had based the piece on four popular beer hall songs and created, by his own admission, "a cheerful potpourri of student songs à la (Franz) von Suppe." Written for the most extravagant forces Brahms ever employed, the

piece begins with the strings and percussion voicing a slightly pompous introduction. The brass proclaims the first of the beer hall songs, *Wir hatten gebauet ein stattliches Haus* (We Have Built a Stately House). It was a well-known and once banned call for a unified Germany. The violas and violins sweep in with a lyrical rendition of *Der Landesvater* (Father of Our Country) followed by the bassoons taking the lead for *Was kommt dort von der Höh?* (What Comes from Afar?), a song associated with freshman initiation. He plays these three melodies against each other leading up to a joyous finale with a grand rendition of *Gaudeamus igitur* (Let Us Rejoice, Therefore). A more colloquial translation would be "Let's party", suggesting that, though he didn't go to university he knew a bit about student life.

In 1877, Brahms recommended **Antonín Dvořák** to his publisher and the younger composer's career was launched beyond the boundaries of his beloved Bohemia. By 1889 Dvořák was being inducted into the Bohemian Academy of Science, Literature and Arts. In thanks for his election to the Academy he composed and conducted the premiere of his *Symphony No. 8 in G Minor*. Unlike his previous symphony it is cheerful and has an upbeat tone. The work was written the summer of 1889 at his summer residence at Vysoká and reflects the happiness that Dvořák felt at his retreat.



His love of the surrounding countryside and his fondness for Czech and Slavonic folk music echo throughout the four movements. The first movement is a traditional sonata, but the themes flow into each other effortlessly in a natural way. A string chorale introduces the pastoral *Adagio* leading to a dialogue between the clarinets and birdlike flutes. The vibrant coda is preceded by a gentle waltz before the trumpets announce the finale. During a rehearsal for this movement conductor Rafael Kubelik said, "... in Bohemia the trumpets never call to battle – they always call to a dance!" And Dvořák wants us to dance.

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


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
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
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
